



The administration has put two large containers in front of the old International Center building. We will outfit one for the Kitchen Exchange and the Resale Shop will use the other for storage. Take a look when you are in the neighborhood! These are temporary solutions but at least useful for the time being. As we look at the year ahead, the Board is optimistic that we can carry on with our regular programs.

We have seen some interesting long-term planning

for the UCSD campus which indicates it will be reoriented to take advantage of the arrival of the trolley. It is hoped that a "gateway" structure will be built and
the International Center can be reconstituted within
the new complex. But in truth, not very soon! In the
meantime, the functions of the Center have been scattered around the campus – certainly not an ideal situation. The old IC has been declared unsafe and it has
been decided that bringing it up to standard would be
too costly, if even possible. We expect it will eventually be torn down. In the meantime, the Friends are
making good use of the small pavilions for some of
their programs.

Woody Allen is credited with saying that 80% of success is showing up. We need you, our members, to show up! Make an extra effort to participate and support your officers in the coming year. Read the Oceanid newsletters. RSVP for functions so we know you still exist. MEET THE NEWCOMERS!

The Oceanids Kitchen Exchange has been serving academic visitors to the UCSD campus for almost 42 years. We rent kitchen and household goods to visiting families from all over the world, helping them to establish their temporary home here as they in turn help to enrich our community. Newcomers usually arrive from their home country with their two suitcases of clothes and computer, never bringing pots and pans. They need to rent everything for the kitchen from us.

And now the Kitchen Exchange needs your help! Maryruth Cox is retiring after more than 30 years of helping foreign Newcomers supply their new homes with pots and pans, dishes, kitchen utensils, irons, toasters, etc. In an email to me she writes: "We've had a long and fruitful time working together, Liz, and I've thoroughly enjoyed it."

Maryruth's departure comes at a traumatic time for us. Because the International Center building has been closed, we will now be located in a big storage container outside the International Center main building and will remain there until the new Gateway building is completed (maybe in 5 years?). When our move to the storage container is completed we will be open on Wednesday mornings only from 10:30 to noon. However, if someone is leaving on a Tuesday, for example, we might make an arrangement to meet them at the

Exchange on Monday rather than make them return everything a week before they leave.

We need both temporary and long term helpers: for example, we have 127 boxes stored in a mini-ware-house that will be delivered in the very near future to be unpacked and placed on the shelves of the storage container. If you want to sign up for an unpacking session, we will be delighted to have you. If you want to extend your help beyond the unpacking, we will be thrilled! Every week we meet interesting people from around the world, and we take the opportunity to tell them about the many activities available to Newcomers.

Our Newcomers Committee also provides many other opportunities for you to have fun. If you can provide transportation for some of our Newcomer activities, you will be rewarded by the opportunity to make new friends. For example, we will need drivers for the December Nights outings when all the museums in Balboa Park are open for free visits. We usually go early and graze on all the ethnic foods for sale at the Houses of Hospitality.

Mary Hanson, League of Women Voters: "November 2016 Ballot Propositions"

Don't vote this November until you hear about the pros and cons of the ballot propositions from Mary Hanson, representing the League of Women Voters Speakers' Bureau. Mary will be discussing the propositions on the ballot for the upcoming election. Even though the League often takes positions on ballot propositions and proposed legislation (although not on candidates) the League makes every effort to be impartial and nonpartisan in these pro/con presentations. Mary is currently on the Board of the local League as treasurer, and has been involved in the League at the local, county and state levels, having served as the San Diego President from 1983-85. Mary is a retired French teacher who has also been active in the San Diego community. During her long tenure at Santana High School she led students six times on trips to France, always an adventure. She received her B.A. in French and Russian from the University of Iowa and her M.A.T. in French and Education from Oberlin College. Mary was on the board of the La Jolla Chamber Music Society for several years and is a longtime member of the Third Thursday book group. She



is also active in UCSD Oceanids, having served as president from 2013 to 2015, and currently on the board as corresponding secretary. She is also active in Cafe Français and the two bridge groups.

Don't miss this presentation about the restoration of the Audrey Geisel University House this Thursday Ione R. Stiegler, FAIA: "Condemnation to Rehabilitation: The Historic UC San Diego Audrey Geisel University House"



Ione R. Stiegler, FAIA is the Principal Architect for IS Architecture, currently celebrating its 27th year. Her office specializes in custom residential design with a unique expertise in historic restoration and the adaptive re-use of rare buildings. Founded in 1989, IS Architecture has won scores of professional awards, including several California Governor's Awards, and a 2014 "Best in American Living" Home of the Year and "One-of-a-Kind Custom Design" award, both from the National Association of Homebuilders. In recognition of her preservation skills, Ms. Stiegler was recently elevated to the College of Fellows of the American Institute of Architects (FAIA)—an honor bestowed on only 2 percent of all AIA members. IS Architecture's work has also been featured more than 60 times in prominent publications such as Better Homes and Gardens and San Diego Home/Garden. In 2014, IS Architecture was awarded the Distinguished Practice Award by the AIA California Council. It was the first time that the AIACC had ever bestowed this award specifically in recognition of an architect's preservation work. Ms. Stiegler is one of the nation's leading experts in preserv-

ing historic adobe and earthen architecture.

At our first board meeting at president Liz Bonkowsky's home to which members brought delicious food, a couple of recipes were asked for; here they are:

If you are looking for something to do with this season's figs, here's a recipe

INGREDIENTS

Tart Crust

1/4 cup blanched almonds 3/4 cup all-purpose flour, spooned and leveled 1/2 cup unsalted butter (1 stick), cut into pieces 1/4 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon fine salt

Filling

1/2 cup blanched almonds

6 tablespoons unsalted butter (3/4 stick), cut into pieces

1/3 cup sugar

2 large eggs

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon fine salt

1/2 pound figs, stems removed and halved

2 tablespoons apricot jam

DIRECTIONS

Make the crust: pulse the almonds in a food processor until finely chopped, 30 to 40 seconds. Add the flour, butter, sugar, and salt. Pulse until the dough starts to come together, 1 to 2 minutes.

Press the dough into a 9-inch tart pan. Refrigerate until firm, at least 30 minutes and up to 2 days.

Make the filling: heat oven to 375° F with the rack in the lowest position.

Pulse the almonds in a food processor until finely chopped, 30 to 40 seconds. Add the butter, sugar, eggs, flour, vanilla, and salt. Process until the mixture is smooth, 1 to 2 minutes.

Place the chilled crust on a rimmed baking sheet. Pour the filling into the crust and smooth with an offset spatula. Top with the figs, cut-side up.

Bake until the crust and custard are golden brown, 30 to 40 minutes.

Combine the apricot jam with 1 tablespoon hot water. Brush top of tart with the apricot glaze.

Serve warm or at room temperature.

Cream Scones with Cranberries Ingredients

2 cups all-purpose flour

1/3 cup sugar

1 tablespoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup cold butter, cut into 1/2-inch cubes

1 cup whipping cream, divided

Handful of dried cranberries (cream and sugar for topping)

Preparation

- 1. Freeze cold butter 5 -10 minutes. Stir together first 4 ingredients in a large bowl. Cut butter into flour mixture with a pastry blender until crumbly and mixture resembles small peas. (You can do this in the food processor; pulse 6-10 times.) Stir in cranberries and make a well. Add 3/4 cup plus 2 Tbsp. cream, stirring just until dry ingredients are moistened.
- 2. Turn dough out onto wax paper; gently press or pat dough into a 7-inch round (mixture will be a bit crumbly). Cut round into wedges (8 for large, or 16 for small). Place wedges 1-2 inches apart on parchment paper or lightly greased pan. Brush tops of wedges with remaining 2 Tbsp. cream just until moistened and sprinkle with sugar. Note 1: I like to have these ready the night before, so I will make the dough ahead of time, wrap dough in plastic and store in the refrigerator overnight. In the morning, I cut the scones into my wedges, in the plastic, and remove the plastic as I place them onto my baking sheet.
- 3. Bake at 450° for 13 to 15 minutes or until golden. (More time may be needed if the dough is cold or frozen.)

Note: The secret to these scones is to have all the ingredients really cold and not to handle them too much with your warm hands. I often cut these scones in wedges and freeze them and bake as many as needed. (Thaw scones on baking dish for about 10-20 mins.) You may also add other fruits or chocolate chips instead of cranberries.
