The Emergency Fund

Several years ago we were given a very generous grant by one of our members. The Board decided to use it to establish an emergency fund – something we had thought would be useful but had never quite had the funding to realize.

The Emergency Fund is administered through the International Students and Program Office (ISPO). It is meant to assist foreign students when they are hit with an unexpected emergency. Most foreign students are far from home and on a very tight budget. They have difficulty coping when unexpected expenses or crises arise.

ISPO works with them to find sources of help and restructure their lives. ISPO has been very careful with the emergency fund but on occasion other options were exhausted and the students have been desperate. The fund has been used three times thus far. For obvious reasons, the details are not shared with us but the most recent case is very sad and we are truly grateful that the fund could assist.

A young woman came here as a student with her husband last year. She became a victim of domestic violence so severe that police were called and she had to be hospitalized. Facing a court case, her husband claimed they had not really been married in their home country. All her efforts seemed to be coming to naught – she lost her part-time jobs and feared she would have to abandon her studies. Her department, to its credit, stepped in and did everything it could to help her out and structure a program so she could finish her degree. ISPO did what it could. Still, she was destitute and as a last resort, ISPO appealed to us. We agreed to ISPO's plan to use the fund to help cover basic living expenses while she

finished up her degree. ISPO wrote us, writing that they are "extremely grateful" for the generosity of the Oceanids and enclosing a letter from the student herself:

Dear Sir/Ma'am at Oceanids,
I would like to thank you for the huge help that
I have received from you! This past month
has been the most stressful month for me as I
was dealing with a lot of issues in my own life
along with the extreme financial crisis. I
sincerely appreciate the generosity and diligency of your organization and it is because
of that that I will be able to continue my studies... in spite of all the hardships in my life. I
seriously have no words to express my gratitude and thanks to the Oceanids Members for
giving me the opportunity to make a life for
myself and stand back on my feet. Please keep
the good work up!

Tales of New Zealand

It can be a concern, when you finally visit a place that you have always wanted to visit. Will it live up to your, possibly overrated, expectations? New Zealand was, for me, such a place, and it exceeded my expectations. When we decided to take a trip away from the stresses of inaugurating a new President, we decided to spend a month in New Zealand. We were also fortunate in having an old colleague of my husband's who now lives in Wellington. My first impressions on landing were that I was in a different version of England, my home country. At the airport, trash bins are called rubbish bins, and getting in a car, you drive on the left side of the road, again something I know well. However, the feeling of spaciousness and lack of crowding soon told me I wasn't in London. With only a total population of 4.64 million, it is very easy to find wide open spaces and empty beaches. Fish & Chips seems to be the unofficial national dish, but we were surprised to learn that most of the fish caught off New Zealand coasts is sold overseas, which drives the price up for New Zealanders. Fish was very expensive; however, beef and lamb were delicious and, since it was Summer, so were the stone fruits. After a few days in the lovely city of Wellington, we flew to the South Island, rented a car & drove around the more Southern part of the Island. The wildlife is amazing, with rare Blue & Yellow Eyed Penguins, and a well managed colony of Northern Royal Albatross, plus beautiful beaches. We spent a couple of nights in Dunedin, a town with a strong Scottish heritage, the first Scottish European settlers having arrived in 1848. It boasts that it has the "World's Steepest Residential Street" according to the Guinness Book of World Records. We bypassed Queenstown, a self titled "Global Adventure Capital", and went to chill out at Kinloch Lodge at the end of an incredibly scenic drive along the lake to the north west of Queenstown. However, the highlight of this trip was to visit, not the better known and very touristy Milford Sound, but Doubtful Sound.




Doubtful Sound is a massive fiord, three times the length & ten times the area of Milford & much less visited. Legend says it got it's name when Captain Cook, who was exploring in 1770, was very concerned that his ship would get blown into this large, deep sound & not get out. So he stayed out at the entrance, and acknowledged his caution by calling it Doubtful Sound. The trip on the Sound in a catamaran with an excellent naturalist was a great experience.

We also rented a nifty camper van to spend a week touring the beaches of North Island, including the famous Bay of Islands. The Kiwis love to camp, hike (called tramping in Kiwi) and be out in their beautiful country. Everywhere you go there are well documented hiking trails. We chose 'Conservation Campsites' run by the Department of Conservation (DOC) and they were amazing, with wonderfully beautiful sites, well equipped and clean facilities, and many in remote areas.

We have only begun to explore this beautiful country & hope to do much more.

What makes New Zealand so welcoming are the New Zealanders!
