#### Title: Will cyber-attacks turn out the lights in the US?

Dr. Cowhey served as the Qualcomm Endowed Chair in Communications and Technology Policy from its inauguration until his retirement. He is an expert on the future of communications and information technology markets and policy, specializing in U.S. trade policy, foreign policy, the Internet, and international corporate strategy. Professor Cowhey joined the UC San Diego faculty in 1976. His two most recent books are "Digital DNA: Disruption and the Challenges for Global Governance" and "Transforming Global Information

and Communication Markets: The Political Economy of Innovation." Dr. Cowhey served in the Obama Administration as the Senior Counselor to the U.S. Trade Representative and in the Clinton Administration as head of international policy at the Federal Communications Commission. Dr. Cowhey received a BSFS degree in Foreign Service from Georgetown University, an MA degree from University of California, Berkeley and a PhD in Political Science from University of California, Berkeley.



#### Texas here I come

When I came to the US in the early 1970s I expected a culture shock when moving from London to Dallas, Texas, and I was not disappointed. Everything was different, from the food, the climate, the size of the cars, and the language, to the number of TV stations. My Texan friends had to teach me everything. Things like how to make a margarita, what a taco is and how to barbeque spare ribs. There were enormous enclosed shopping malls where you could shop in comfort regardless of the weather. I still remember a friend taking me to a Baskin Robbins with their dozens of wonderful ice creams. Up to that point English shops only offered vanilla, chocolate and neapolitan ice cream. Nowadays the world is much more globalized and the difference in culture has been blurred or almost eradicated, particularly between England and America. But in the '70s I felt as if I had landed on a different planet. Clearly I was very ignorant about the US and

came to
realize that

In

England we kick off the holiday season with Bonfire Night on November 5. This is a tradition celebrating a man called Guy Fawkes who almost succeeded in blowing up Westminster Palace with King James 1 and parliament inside, in The Gunpowder Plot of 1605. Fawkes was found guarding the gunpowder under the palace and sentenced to be hung, drawn and quartered. The failure of the Gunpowder Plot is commemorated as Guy Fawkes night, with huge bonfires and fireworks in many English towns. There isn't any food associated with this celebration but the pubs always do a roaring business.

When moving to the US I discovered
Thanksgiving which I immediately embraced as it
seemed to be centered around food. I had never seen
such big turkeys, or so many piles of good food. How do
you find room for the delicious pies? There is barely
time to finish all the leftovers before the Christmas
season starts. A Santa Claus appears in every mall often
looking uncomfortably warm in their red outfits.
Christmas food that I grew up with was centered on a
cold winter climate. We usually had a roast goose with
stuffing, lots of roast veggies and gravy followed by a
Christmas pudding with brandy butter. This is a rich
heavy meal suitable for a cold winter climate. Not
surprisingly this isn't what my Texan friends served
which was usually roast turkey

In the decades since I first arrived in the US I have had lots of delicious holiday meals, but never roast goose. I have however, had the time to develop my own traditions and always have Christmas crackers, a live Christmas tree, and a friend makes me a Christmas pud and mails it to me.

One time I brought a pud home in my carry on luggage, a round heavy thing wrapped in foil. The TSA people were about to confiscate it when one of them recognized it as a Christmas pud and I was allowed to keep it.

## Christmas in Hamburg/Germany Roswitha Enright

In the seemingly prehistoric times when I grew up in Northern Germany, there were no celebrations for Valentine's Day or Halloween like there are today. And even Christmas has undergone transformations ...

The pine tree, always real, was bought shortly before Christmas and brought into the designated room early on Christmas Eve. We children were not allowed into that room anymore, while my parents fastened real candles and decorations onto the tree's branches.

Nervously we practiced the poems or little songs we had prepared, while waiting in the hallway for the magical moment. In the late afternoon, when it was good and dark outside, the door was finally opened, and there was the tree, with candles lit, in all its glory. Little areas had been set up for the unwrapped presents for each child. Our grandparents were sitting on the couch, and we children, my twin and I first as the youngest, stepped forward to recite our well-rehearsed lines. After every child had contributed, a few Christmas songs were sung by all, and then, finally, we were allowed to look at our presents. It was all very exciting.

The next day, we always went to the home of our mother's sister after we had enjoyed the traditional roast goose, stuffed with apples. According to Charles Dickens, goose was for poor people who could not afford turkey. I had never heard of eating turkey before. And now, goose is sooo much more expensive here than turkey. On December 26, we always went to the home of our father's sister, every year without fail. Not so exciting. New Year's Eve was wonderful. In the late afternoon, after night had fallen, we went from house to house in the neighborhood and asked for

treats or threatened tricks, just like Halloween here. I don't remember whether we wore disguises, but we had a little verse when knocking on doors to make people come out and give us sweets or apples: "Rummel, rummel rush, New year sits behind the bush. Give me a little apple cake or a small sausage. Is the sausage too small give me two for one. If it is too big it tastes twice as good." I do not remember the threats!

Once we got back home, there were certain rituals

to be
followed.
Our
parents
always
had carp
to eat,
though
we were
allowed
sausages
and
potato

that had



salad since we did not like the fish. After dinner, it came time for our father to tell us our future. For that, we melted little pieces of lead in a spoon over a flame and then quickly poured it into a bowl with cold water where it solidified. Our father would look at the shapes the lead formed and from that would tell us what would happen in the coming year. The candles on the tree were lit one last time later in the evening, and promptly at midnight, the fireworks started. People went into the streets and yelled Happy New Year to one another. We were always allowed to stay up for the fireworks I don't know whether our older siblings found these days as thrilling as we did, but for my twin and me, they were magical.
